SUBMISSION GUIDELINES FOR THE SVI 2024 CONFERENCE

Language and formatting:

The paper should be submitted in English, with the following formatting:

- **Page Size**: A4 (all margins 2.54cm);
- Font: Times New Roman 12pt;
- Line Spacing: 1.5;
- Space before and after paragraph: None;
- New paragraph: Indented first line; Alignment: Justified;
- Titles: In-text titles (books, games, etc.) should use *italics* and not quotation marks;
- **Headings**: Numbered, bold, 12pt; **Alignment**: Left;
- Notes: Use footnotes for notes, not references; Font: Times New Roman 10pt; Line Spacing: Single;

Title page:

Author information: The upper left corner should contain, in descending order, each in a new line: 1) Author's name and surname 2) Affiliation (college, institute, faculty, or university) 3) Email address. The pattern repeats for any co-authors.

Title: Times New Roman 14pt, all caps, centred, bold, below author information; Titles within the title should also use *italics* instead of quotation marks.

Summary and Keywords: Use **Line Spacing**: Single; **Font**: Times New Roman 12pt; List up to 5 relevant keywords.

Following the above should be the text and bibliography at the end of the paper.

Other guidelines:

Paper length: The paper should be between 25.000–30.000 characters with spaces, including all headings, titles, footnotes, summary, and bibliography.

The **title** should clearly point to the problem or subject of scholarly analysis. If necessary, it can also reflect or specify historical, disciplinary, theoretical and/or methodological context of the subject or the manner in which it is being considered in the paper.

The **Summary** is a concise, clear and informative overview of the problem/subject of scholarly analysis, and should also contain the crux of the argumentation presented in the paper, as well as the main conclusions of the paper. Depending on the type of paper, the summary may also refer to a theoretical or methodological framework, research methods that were used, and other pertinent factors involved in the gathering or analysis of data in the paper.

Keywords are scholarly terms or general descriptors that relate to common or particular characteristics of the subject, or relate to various scholarly or methodological frameworks. Authors should strive to list those keywords that are most pertinent and well-established in their chosen fields.
